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Walking on Air at Feshie

Walking on Air made its annual visit to the Cairngorm Gliding Club at Feshie for the Mayfest early in May. Gliders K21 WA1 and LS7 WA2 made the trip into the mountains with other SGU members and gliders. Most of us stayed at the Badaguish Outdoor Centre nearby, which has very good disabled facilities.

As usual on these visits Feshie made us all welcome and made room in

the clubhouse for several wheelchairs without complaint! The weather was mixed, but some good flights were had by all members, including one by Dave Tuttle who was towed to the top of Glen Feshie by Nick Norman in a NE wind into a gap in the clouds - Nick advised that there was a "hydraulic jump" which was indeed very rough with strong lift to the ex-

tent that the glider was still gaining height at 90 kts in spite of using full airbrake. There was also a lot of sink!

Maria Duncan and Gordon Macleod had several rather less bumpy flights in strong thermals up to cloud base at c6,500' over the snow covered Cairngorms, with amazing views and some flying through snow showers.

The disabled local people who usually fly with us were sadly too unwell

this year, but we look forward to flying them next year. On a previous visit we flew one young disabled boy who, after landing, turned to the instructor and said "for once I will have something to boast about at school tomorrow". Made it all worthwhile.

We look forward to going again next year to this very friendly club in a beautiful part of Scotland.



Walking on Air would welcome more helpers to join the Friday rota. There are always two helpers who take out and DI WA1, help disabled people in and out and put the glider away. Helpers are usually rotated no more than once a month.

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Portmoak History - Andrew Thorburn's Big Stone

For about a year before the Second World War, and on occasions during the late 1940's and early 1950's, when conditions were suitable, gliders were launched from Bishop Hill.

Before the war, gliders were dragged up the hill from the SGU's training area around East Feal cottage, about a mile to the east of the hilltop, and were launched from around the bowl, by bungey or winch. After the war, when the club was based at Balado Airfield, the hill was too far away to reach, unless the pilot was able to thermal there, so a couple of single seat Cadet gliders were kept in a hut at the top of the wood, and on west wind days, they could be rigged and bungey launched from the top of the ridge above the golf course.

Throughout both periods, the normal landing area was on the top of the southern spur of the bowl, the area marked as the Pinnels on the O/S map. The area

is quite flat, and covered with tussocky grass, no problem for gliders with skids, except for one snag – a single large boulder in the centre of the area, deeply embedded in the turf, just waiting to rip the bottom out of any unwary glider.

The solution was low tech, but effective. The duty instructor, who was generally Andrew Thorburn, founder member and first CFI of the SGU, would stand on the stone, to mark its position, whenever a glider was about to land. Perhaps he would also throw in a few hand signals, like the deck landing officer on a carrier, to help the pilots with their approaches!

Next time you take a walk up Bishop, have a look for Andra's Big Stane – it will likely still be there until the glaciers come again.

Sant Cervantes

Hus Bos Challenge Cup – Regionals Competition. 3 – 11 August 2019

There were 50 gliders entered in total in a single class.

From Portmoak we had

Saturday 3rd

192km task set. I ended up 6^{th,} Gareth was 10th and Kate 12th. The conditions were weak and a bit difficult but we had a good run around the short task. All of the times were quite slow with the day winner only doing 83kph.

Sunday 4th - Scrubbed

Monday 5th

The task was 300km. I managed to get around OK but, as usual, was too slow and was 21st beaten by Brian and Adrian. Dougie Wilson managed to get a prize for his double land-out – arriving first at Lyveden gliding site and then in a field a few km away from Hus Bos when the aerotow retrieve back released in turbulence.

Tuesday 6th

The day was scrubbed after we gridded. Cloudbase never got high enough to launch the grid.

Wednesday 7th

I was near the front of the grid so launched early but then really struggled to stay up. Having spent 2 hours scrapping about mostly at circuit height after dumping water I eventually had to land back at Hus Bos before the start opened - along with about 10 other gliders. I took a relight and head off on task where I got stuck at the downwind turnpoint near Alconbury with weak climbs and 20kt of wind making it difficult to make any progress. I eventually had to start the engine to get back as did Brian and Kate.

Tony almost got back but ended up in a field about 5km short.

Thursday 8th

A proper English Thermal Day. 300km task.

A proper racing day with Brian coming 6th with just short of 100kph but Tony ending up at 23rd - despite doing the task at 91kph - and me at 33rd due to not being able to fly in straight lines. It was nice to be on a comfortable final glide well before the last turn point and able to come back quite fast which boosted my snail pace to 86kph.

Gareth managed 31st with 87kph and Dougie Wilson also made it round the task at a respectable 74kph.

Adrian made it around most of the task but then ended up in a field not far from the airfield as he had set the wrong height on the 3km finish ring (500' below ground) and didn't notice until too late.

Alan Gillanders had to start his FES just 8km from site as the day died after managing his longest XC flight so far at 253km and Alan Boyle did a respectable 139km.

Friday 9th - Sat 11th - Scrubbed.
